
21 Ideas

for Recruiting Diverse Students into STEM Clubs




- 1 Offer extra credit for students who attend a TAME Club.
- 2 Encourage older students to mentor younger students in TAME, then count those as service hours.
- 3 Have students turn in registration forms during the first week of school.
- 4 Offer a club activity during class or at lunch to give students a preview.
- 5 Create a Facebook group that showcases each meeting to appeal to parents, not just students.
- Showcase Engineering Design Challenges from previous STEM Competitions.



- 7 For students who ride buses, meet during lunch and homeroom.
- Work with other STEM-related clubs to recruit from all grade levels.
- Serving snacks is a great motivator; partner with a local food bank or business to donate snacks.
- 10 Encourage students to recruit, teach, and mentor younger grades to build leadership skills.
- 11 Have a special tutorial class for TAME Club members.
- 12 Be flexible when scheduling club meetings.
- 13 Make TAME extracurricular with a grade attached.
- 14 Try keeping meetings short, and offer them frequently.
